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#### **Possible Extension Activity: Elementary**

Have students create a poster or visual aide that depicts this career. Pictures and words may be used to describe appropriate information including, but not limited to, the following:

- Tasks that are completed daily by a person with this occupation;
- The types of uniform or equipment that may be required for this occupation;
- Education and training requirements a person must complete for this occupation; and
- The possible work environment or setting.

### Possible Extension Activity: Secondary

The interviewee describes multiple occupations within their respective business/company that represent a variety of diverse career pathways, which can be used to launch a deeper study. Teachers can choose to lead a class discussion to brainstorm related careers. For example:

"American Water employees represent multiple career opportunities. Let's see how many different careers we can list from the interview." (i.e., skilled/technical, finance, human resources, quality control, safety, etc.)

Students then research to learn more about one of the identified careers. Research topics may include, but are not limited to, the following facts and information:

- Qualifications and education/training requirements;
- Where an individual may seek training and education for the career;
- Typical day-to-day duties and responsibilities;
- Average salary in Kentucky;
- Job forecast and demand in Kentucky (current and projected data); and
- Working conditions/environment.
