Thompson Navigates Transition

Throughout Thompson's time as chair, the search to find a successor for Kentucky Chamber President and CEO Dave Adkisson was a key focus. Ahead of the public announcement that Adkisson would retire after 15 years as the head of the organization, Thompson worked behind the scenes with other board members and business leaders from across the state to put together a strong, diverse search committee to ensure a robust and successful national search for the new Chamber president.

After a serious, intensive, yearlong process, Thompson said the committee was pleased to announce their decision that Kentucky Chamber Senior Vice President of Public Affairs Ashli Watts will take over as head of the organization.

In the process of choosing a new leader and public awareness of Adkisson's retirement, Thompson said he believes the Chamber continued to establish itself as one of the strongest voices at the Capitol and a catalyst for change across the state.

Another goal of his time as the chair of the Chamber, Thompson said, was to build upon successes the

organization has seen legislatively and across the state with initiatives to improve workforce and education, address the opioid crisis, and more.

Thompson said he believes the Chamber continues to think bigger and bolder and accomplish a great amount. And while there is still much work to be done on critical issues facing Kentucky including updates to an outdated tax code and reforms to

the state's woefully underfunded pension systems, Thompson said those issues have remained in the public eye due to the strong voice of the Kentucky Chamber advocating for change.

As the Kentucky Chamber Board Chair, Thompson said he has become more involved with all aspects of the organization and its membership and has enjoyed the unique opportunity to have important conversations with businesses and

> leaders from across the state to shape crucial actions, which he feels should be a driving force for Kentucky companies to get involved with the organization.

"If you want to make certain things happen, from a business perspective, your local chamber and the state Chamber are great avenues to make things happen. If you are not a member [of the state Chamber], and you want to get something for your business, whether it is policies, laws, regulations...if you want to get some action there, you would be surprised at how well the Chamber can do that for you," Thompson said. "If you're not [a member of the Chamber], recognize the Chamber can make things happen for you. Don't underestimate what the Chamber can do for you."

Moving ahead, Thompson looks forward to seeing what the Chamber accomplishes under Watts's leadership and is confident the organization will sustain growth in important initiatives across the state and continue to be the leading voice for progrowth advocacy.

Attorney General Race Candidates

TALK ISSUES WITH THE BOTTOM LINE

The race for Kentucky attorney general is one of the most hotly contested elections of 2019. While Kentuckians closely watch the governor's race, many view this year's attorney general race as the first real chance for a Republican to take that office in more than 70 years.

Republican newcomer Daniel Cameron is going head-to-head with Democrat Greg Stumbo, who served in the office of attorney general in 2004 and served in legislative leadership for many years. Both candidates sat down with The Bottom Line to discuss the race, their priorities, and what they expect in the coming weeks.

Democrat Greg Stumbo is a native of Prestonsburg, Kentucky who served a four-year term as attorney general from 2004-2008 before returning to the legislature and becoming Speaker of the House in 2009. He lost his re-election race for the state House in 2017. Stumbo currently practices law as a partner with Morgan & Morgan.

Republican Daniel Cameron, a native of Elizabethtown, Kentucky is a practicing attorney with Frost, Brown, Todd, LLC. Cameron has also served as legal counsel to U.S. Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell and practiced law as an attorney for Stites and Harbison after starting his career serving as a law clerk to the Honorable Gregory Van Tatenhove, a United States District Court Judge for the Eastern District of Kentucky.

Kentucky has not had a Republican attorney general since 1948. When asked what it would mean for the state if he is elected in November, Cameron said it would mean the office is held by someone who has the same values as the majority of Kentuckians and is prioritizing protection of the rule of law. He added he feels most people in Kentucky are looking to de-politicize the office and get back to what he calls the "bread and butter basics" including being a partner to state and federal law enforcement and defending and enforcing the laws passed by the General Assembly.

When asked why he decided to run for the office of attorney general again after his last term finishing in 2008, Stumbo said his driving motivation is the opioid crisis being faced by Kentucky. Stumbo noted Kentucky was the first state to sue Purdue Pharma when he was attorney general, and he said he wants to finish the work he started on this issue.







BUS TO BUSINESS:

Students Visit Local Businesses as Part of Statewide Workforce Initiative

In October, schools from across the Commonwealth visited employers in their communities to learn about local career opportunities as part of a partnership with the Kentucky Chamber Workforce Center, Jobs for America's Graduates (JAG) Kentucky, and members of the business community.



As Kentucky's business community struggles with a workforce shortage, the Kentucky Chamber Workforce Center started the Bus to Business initiative as a way to connect businesses with students in local communities. While students had the opportunity to explore possible careers within each company, employers were able to speak directly to their potential future workforce.

During Bus to Business Day, over 1,200 students visited 32 businesses in 24 counties. Students had the chance to tour businesses, complete hands-on, work-based learning activities, and speak directly with business leaders about their professions.

"We are thrilled that the inaugural Bus to Business Day helped provide an

opportunity for students across Kentucky to get a close up look at exciting career opportunities. KENTUCKY EMPLOYERS SEE TOTAL OF

25% Decrease in Workers' Compensation Costs Over Two Years

Kentucky employers can expect another significant decrease in workers' compensation costs as the Kentucky Department of Insurance (DOI) has announced the approval of the 2019 rate filing used to develop rates for workers' compensation coverage, showing an average decrease of 9 percent for Kentucky employers.

According to the figures submitted in the 2019 annual rate filing, the average reduction of 9 percent across the class codes includes manufacturing, office and clerical, contracting, and goods and services. Over the past two years, employers have seen an average 25 percent decrease.

Department of Insurance Commissioner Nancy Atkins credits much of the decrease in costs to the passage of House Bill 2, which made significant reforms to the workers' compensation system for the first time in over twenty years.

"The overall decrease demonstrates the effectiveness of HB 2 and the commitment of Kentucky employers to employee safety," said Atkins. "The Commonwealth is taking the necessary steps to increase investment and job creation. The decreased claim figures continue to make Kentucky an attractive state to do business."

While the bill made many improvements to the system, its passage was also critical because of what could have transpired had the legislation not been approved. Over the past few years, the Kentucky Supreme Court found several Kentucky workers' compensation statutes unconstitutional, dealing a blow to every employer in the Commonwealth.

The Kentucky Chamber led a coalition of nearly 50 businesses along with private and public agencies and associations to advance the cause. The



Kentucky Chamber was joined by the Kentucky League of Cities, the Kentucky Association of Counties, the Kentucky Retail Federation, the Kentucky School Board Association, the Kentucky Professional Firefighters Association and large employers such as Toyota, Ford, and UPS to demonstrate the broad appeal of the hill

The approved rate filing went into effect Oct. 1.
