A True Sense of Kentucky

When the Kentucky Chamber renovated our headquarters just off I-64 in Frankfort, we wanted visitors to have a true sense of Kentucky when they entered our building. With 7,000 square feet of new meeting space, the Chamber regularly entertains business and political leaders, foreign dignitaries and visitors. The space needed to have a strong Kentucky character, and what better way to do that than by highlighting some of Kentucky's best artists and craftsmen? Thanks to the generous grant from Brown-Forman – a great corporate steward and supporter of the arts – and guidance from the Kentucky Arts Council, we were able to initially feature 10 artists and more than 25 pieces of art in our offices. We hope to add to the collection annually.

Visitors entering our building are flanked by four, 20-foot panoramic views of the Commonwealth taken by photographer Jeff Rogers, gracing the upper walls of our atrium. On the lower walls, visitors can enjoy landscape oils by Chris Lewis-Segre and John Lackey, mixed media works by Darrell Ishmael, a stained glass sculpture by Dan Neil Barnes, and furnishings by artists such Mark Whitley, to name a few. A selection committee convened by Brown-Forman made the final selections.

The entire investment in Kentucky artists was 2% of the total building project budget, but the investment yielded a building that is infinitely more attractive and enjoyable for visitors than it would have been otherwise. We thank Kentucky's talented art community for helping us make that happen.

Sgraffito Plates

Nine 16-17" diameter platters were hand thrown and hand carved using an ancient pottery method called sgraffito, in which a clay-based color is sprayed on the surface of each piece before it is fired. Then, lines are incised using a tool to remove color and expose the white of the porcelain.

Paintings are on Artist Edge Gallery Wrapped canvases and depict four seasons and four distinct Kentucky settings.



Kentucky Wide


