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## WORKFORCE

Over the past two decades, Kentucky has consistently experienced significantly low labor force participation, ranking nationally in the bottom ten states. More than ever, employers must be in the



driver's seat, leading the way to develop a strong workforce.

Kentucky should set a goal of growing its total workforce by 130,000 new workers by 2027.

The Talent Pipeline Management (TPM®) program, operated by the Kentucky Chamber Foundation's Workforce Center, aligns the workforce needs of employers with education,



Almost 400 employers are at the table working together to help strengthen our workforce across Kentucky's key and signature industries, and to date, approximately 500 Kentuckians have been placed in meaningful employment because of this work.

### As of July 2022, Kentucky had nearly **100,000 more open jobs** than unemployed Kentuckians looking for work.

In 2022, the Workforce Recovery Program launched the inaugural **Fair Chance Academy**, a training program that provides businesses with the knowledge and resources to help successfully hire, train, and retain talent from fair chance populations. Through this Academy, <u>20 Kentucky businesses became certified as Fair Chance Employers in 2022</u>, which impacts over 20,000 employees.





The Foundation's Workforce Recovery Program team <u>helped a number of companies recruit 4,000 fair chance job opportunities and over 40,000 fair chance jobs since the program's inception.</u>

Between 1970 and 2017, Kentucky experienced the highest increase in "gross brain drain" in the nation, meaning throughout that time period Kentucky saw the fastest growing gap between the number of highly educated residents leaving the state and those remaining in the state.

**Bus to Business**® is a statewide initiative focused on connecting students with employers. The program aims to show students what career pathways are in their own communities. In 2022, the Foundation engaged over 3,500 students in

workforce conversations and activities, which resulted in 630 work-based learning and employment opportunities. The Foundation also created a Bus to Business® coloring book that highlighted jobs in key industries, and almost 12,000 coloring books were distributed to elementary schools and libraries across Kentucky.

The Kentucky Chamber Foundation recently launched the Center for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DE&I), which aims to create deliberate, meaningful, and



sustainable change to address inequality in Kentucky.

In the first year of the Center for DE&I, the Foundation's work has garnered widespread exposure by hosting over 40 trainings and workshops to over 130 unique businesses and through numerous interviews and speaking engagements.

The Center for DE&I also established a task force, which is made up of almost 40 of Kentucky's key DE&I business leaders. Through the Foundation's work in the equity space, the Center for DE&I team helped to increase the number of minority business enterprises that are members of the Kentucky Chamber by 45%.

In 2022, the Center for DE&I launched the Kentucky Minority-Owned Business Database (**www.MBDKY.com**) with 1,000 minority-owned businesses included and almost 6,000 site visits since its launch.

In addition, the Chamber hosted the Inaugural Kentucky Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Summit with over 350 attendees, 26 speakers, and 131 unique businesses and organizations represented.

over 519 public and private school principals from across Kentucky. In 2022, 80 principals, representing 46,000 Kentucky students from 41 counties, participated in the program. In 2022,

Kentucky's business community contributed more than \$580,000 dollars to provide this program at no cost to the participating principals.

In 2022, the Foundation also hosted a tenyear anniversary celebration for the Leadership Institute for School Principal program, recognizing graduates of the program and those who have supported the program. At the event, the Foundation established the Deirdre Lyons Scholarship Fund to support executive training for future participants.

In 2022, Kentucky was chosen as one of two states to

participate in the U.S. Chamber of Commerce Foundation's **National Civics Bee competition**, which shows young Americans how they can positively contribute to their

local civic life. During this inaugural competition, middle school students from across the Commonwealth submitted essays about how they would solve a problem in their community, and the top ten essayists participated in a live competition.

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## **DISASTER RECOVERY**

On December 10, 2021, devastating tornadoes moved across Kentucky, producing catastrophic damage. In partnership





with Kentucky Sports Radio (KSR), the Foundation worked to raise \$1.7 million from our fellow Kentuckians and individuals around the world. \$951,000 of this was donated to Kentucky Habitat for Humanity to help rebuild communities impacted by the tornadoes, and \$700,000 was donated to Volunteers of America to support recovery efforts in communities impacted.

In July 2022, floods devastated parts of eastern Kentucky and impacted many of our neighbors. Once again, the Foundation partnered with KSR to build a relief fund to ensure our fellow Kentuckians can rebuild. With more than \$200,000 raised in this fund, the Foundation and KSR are working with local communities, local chambers, and state and local elected officials to ensure the needs of these areas are met in the wake of tragedy.
